## Legend:

- ❶ **IDC 4U0** – This course is designed for students interested in entertainment, sports, and event marketing. Emphasis is placed on the media, economics, and licensing which drives modern marketing and the growing entertainment industry.  
(Preferred Prerequisites: BMI3C0 - Marketing or BAF3M0 - Accounting)
- ❷ **IDC 309** and **IDC 4U9** – These interdisciplinary courses provide students with strong written communication, visual design, and communication technology skills. They allow students the opportunity to plan, promote, and produce the school yearbook within a curricular setting. Emphasis is placed on developing written and visual communication skills, computer-based graphic design skills, marketing, and team collaboration.  
(**IDC 309** Preferred Prerequisites: AVI 2O0 - Visual Arts, AWT 2O0 – Non-Traditional Media, ENG 2D0 - Academic English or TGJ 2O0 - Communications Technology)  
(**IDC 4U9** Preferred Prerequisite: AVI 3M0 - Visual Arts, AWQ 3M0 - Photography, ENG 3U0 - University English, or TGJ 3M0 - Communications Technology)
- ❸ Students can select either **IDC 4U0** or **IDC 4U9**. (Students cannot take both of these courses.)
- ❹ Strongly recommended that students have at least 70% in Grade 8 non-modified math before taking **MPM 1D0**.
- ❺ Strongly recommended that students have between 50% and 69% in Grade 8 non-modified math before taking **MFM 1P0**.
- ❻ **MAT 1L0** is strongly recommended for students previously registered in Grade 8 modified math.
- ❼ Strongly recommended that students have at least 70% in the prerequisite Math course for: grade 10 applied and academic level courses; grade 11 college, mixed and university level courses; and grade 12 university level courses.
- ❽ **ETS 4U0** - This course is designed for students with an interest in literature. The central focus is writing and media that deal with sports. Works with a focus on sports from classical to modern literature will be examined alongside modern media. (This course does not count as a substitute for ENG 4U0.)

- \* **English as a Second Language (ESL)** is an accelerated English language program. Generally, students in the ESL program choose and complete two (2) ESL courses per academic year until they have finished ESL level D or E. Students enrolled in this program are entitled to accommodations such as extra time for tests, exams and standardized assessments.
- ★ English language learners may also receive additional assistance by choosing “Subject Support Courses For English Language Learners”. These courses are recommended for students in beginner to intermediate levels (ESL levels A, B or C).

## SPECIALIST HIGH SKILLS MAJOR (SHSM)

### HEALTH AND WELLNESS

The **Health and Wellness SHSM** program at Mississauga S.S. is a specialized program that builds a foundation of sector-focused knowledge and skills before graduating and entering apprenticeship training, college, university, or the workplace. It incorporates the disciplines of Health and Physical Education, Science, Math, English, Social Sciences and Humanities, and Co-op in the customizing of a secondary school education to help students focus on a career path in the health and wellness sector. The program provides exciting opportunities for students to gain valuable industry-recognized skills, career-relevant training, sector specific training and certifications, experiential learning, and reach-ahead opportunities that relate to the chosen post-secondary pathways at colleges, universities, apprenticeships, and the workplace. Students who complete this Ministry of Education approved program earn the SHSM red seal on their high school diploma.

In order to complete this SHSM in Health and Wellness, students must:

1. Complete a bundle of 9 specific courses (see chart below);
2. Complete Sector Certifications and/or training programs;
3. Participate in experiential learning and career exploration activities within the sector (e.g., workshops, guest speakers, career forums, job shadowing, job twinning);
4. Gain "Reach Ahead" experiences connected to the student's post-secondary plans (e.g., college and university tours).

- This chart is a general pathway guide. SHSM students may complete courses from any pathway.
- Some courses are both "Major" and "Other" courses - these can only count as one or the other.
- Co-op placements must relate to the Health and Wellness Sector.
- Co-op can be taken in day school (2 or 4 credit). If taking 4 credit co-op, 1 credit can substitute as a "Major" course, and 1 credit can substitute as an "Other" course.
- Co-op Dual Credit courses can count toward credits in the sector as both "Major" and "Other" courses.
